### **11. Subsequent Event**

The recent events of the COVID-19 pandemic have had an economic impact on Canada and globally. Swan Lake First Nation will also be impacted by this pandemic. This includes, but is not limited to a significant decline in VLT revenues and a slight decline in cabin rental revenues. As well, future economic conditions may impact the operations of Swan Lake First Nation, such as tenants being unable to pay their rent. Management is actively monitoring the affect on its financial condition, liquidity, and operations. Although the disruption from the virus is expected to be temporary, given the dynamic nature of these circumstances, the duration and the related financial impact cannot be reasonably estimated.
